Letter from the organization



We are excited to present this report, which summarizes our work over the past few years to build a more resilient food system through a community-based project. What began as an idea from agroecology students at SLU has, with your support, evolved into a successful initiative. Now, after three years of operation, we are proud to share the results.

This report highlights our key accomplishments, the impact we've made, and our commitment to advancing sustainable practices and educational opportunities in agroecology.

We hope this report shows the importance of supporting projects like ours. Our work has profoundly impacted many lives by providing a place for collective learning, offering high-quality food through a fair system, and personal growth.

However, without support this very ambitious project will not be able to sustain itself in the future as it is currently depending on the physical, monetary, and mental investments of individuals working in the project.

Who are we?

Alnarp's Agroecology Farm is a small-scale farm, that operates as a non-profit organization run by (post-grad) students. It has evolved into a space that connects the local community while providing fresh, agroecologically grown vegetables—cultivated without chemicals and by hand. Our farm is a hub for both agricultural and social scientific exploration and research, offering an alternative to the current food system to promote fairness and resilience.

Organizational history

Autumn 2020

4 students of the Agroecology Master's program started the project out of frustration with the lock-down and the lack of practical education within their program.

2021

Building of the first plot, on Grobruket land (back then Venture Lab). Selling through a CSA scheme to local community & building up a wider team and raising interest in the project.

2022

Expansion to Mellangard on the edge of the campus.

2023

Maintanance and further establishemnt within SLU and beyond, particularly Lund University and the local municipalities. Advisory Board established.

2024

Further expanding the growing area of the farm, hiring four of the board members and further professionalizing the project.

We provide professional academic and free standing internships as part of our educational activities

Internships can be accredited by SLU nad other Universities within the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS). Outside of that AAf is offering free-standing internships for individuals starting from age 16.

Interns get included into the daily gardening and organisational work to get a deep insight into the realities of running a production system as an NGO: Depending on the person's academic background and personal interest they hold specific responsibilities and receive specific training in particular areas of our operation.

CSA Scheme

Our CSA is the core of our organization and how we take part in agroecological food systems

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) involves sharing the risks of crop production with the local community. This community pre-buys the produce with costs spread across the season which helps Alnarp's Farm work towards economic sustainability. CSA schemes require full transparency and a closer connection with customers than other indirect sales channels. Our produce is freshly harvested each week and can be collected from pick-up points in Alnarp, Lund and Malmö throughout the 20 week season. Regional flowers can also be purchased alongside the vegetable boxes.

Income until September 2024 The following is the current financial postion of the farm. Mainly a lack of 25 CSA subscriptions from the start of the season as well as too little capacity for additional workshops have cut through our highly ambitious financial plans we set ourselves for 2024.

Financial Statements 17 Loss through the fire

Recently our entire outdoor kitchen burnt down. The cause of the fire remains unknown to this date. The kitchen was a central place for our community, a place where we would share meals, discuss, and come up with ideas for the future of agriculture.

Aside from the loss of materials and labor, the loss of the kitchen also means a loss of income. The kitchen provided a consistent income over the past season. The expected loss of income for 2025 if we were not to rebuild would be:

In order to run the farm without needing to exploit the security savings and to recover from the fire, the following amount is lacking to sustain the work force and being able to cover investments needed for 2025. This amount however, is based on 4 part-time positions at 50% pace, while the workload remains full-

Future Outlook



At AAF, we want to continue inspiring people from various academic and cultural backgrounds to become active in agroecology. As a farm we aim to become a research facility for SLU, as well as a living lab for agroecology for this region and beyond. We have already made connections with farms in Colombia, Kenia, and Tanzania.

Furthermore, we want to encourage and foster more interdisciplinary research in remaining a space for exploration of new methods and approaches.

By further expanding our production area and methods, for example with poultry production, we want to represent different scales of agroecological farming practices and in that engage a broader target group of students, policy makers, organizations and individuals.

As an organization we are committed to continuously question and improve our modes of management and production to become the model farm for agroecology. The foundation has already been laid out by SIANI who has now officially chosen us as the model farm of agroecology in the nordics.

We are excited to welcome more collaborations and strengthening the network for agroecology; as a scientific hub, agricultural practice and a social movement and community.

Future outlook Financial statement

The organization is currently run by a board of 4 students and 4 post-graduates. The latter are employed but are only compensated for half of their working time, while the workload is equivalent to full-time positions. Next to running the farm, these positions allow for the organization to provide educational and social activities, and build (international) collaborations. To ensure the future of the farm and allow for further development, compensation equivalent to full-time positions needs to be available. Furthermore, two additional summer jobs should be included in the sum to ensure that activities during the high season run smoothly.
